





## Foreign students enrolled in tertiary education outside their country of origin, numbers and %, 2010





## Trends in the number of foreign students enrolled in tertiary education outside their country of origin, 2000-2010





## Citizens enrolled in tertiary education in EU-21 destinations as a percentage of all students enrolled abroad, 2010





## Trends in the number of foreign students in higher education in Germany, 1997-2012





## Foreign students with foreign education in Germany by region of origin, 2012






## Foreign students with foreign education in Germany from the top 20 countries of origin, 2012



## Number of foreign students in Germany by origin of education and type of HEI, 2011





## Foreign students with foreign education in Germany as a percentage of all students per subject group and by type of HEI, 2012



## Common reasons for studying in Germany, 2009


foreign students, in %, rated in terms of importance on a scale of 1 (= not at all) to 5 (= totally), 4 and 5 ratings only





## Difficulties with studies and everyday life in Germany, 2009


foreign students, proportion who experience (major) difficulties, in %




## Satisfaction with student services in Germany, 2009
