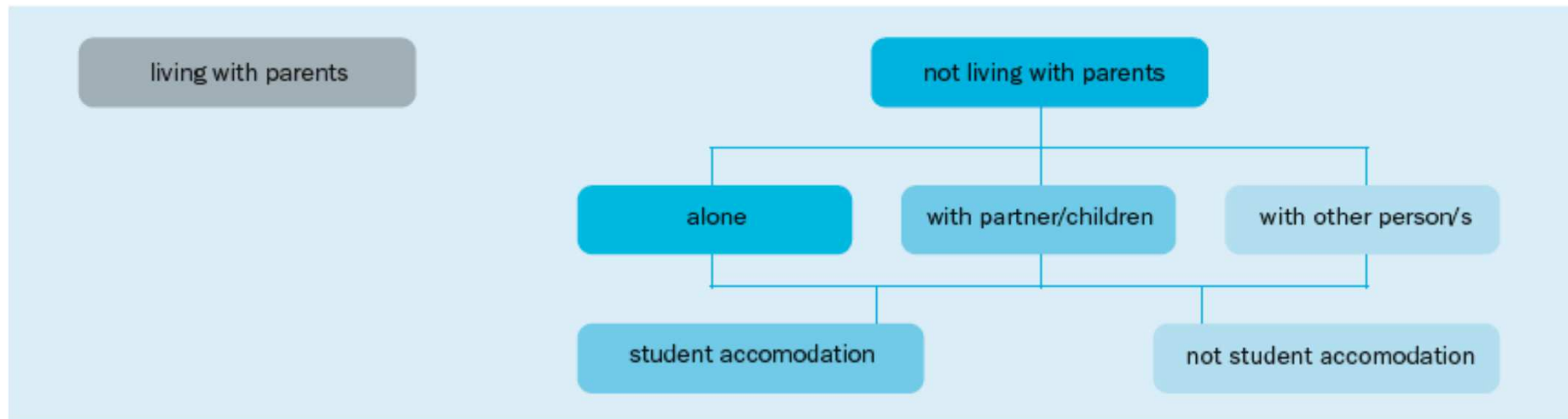

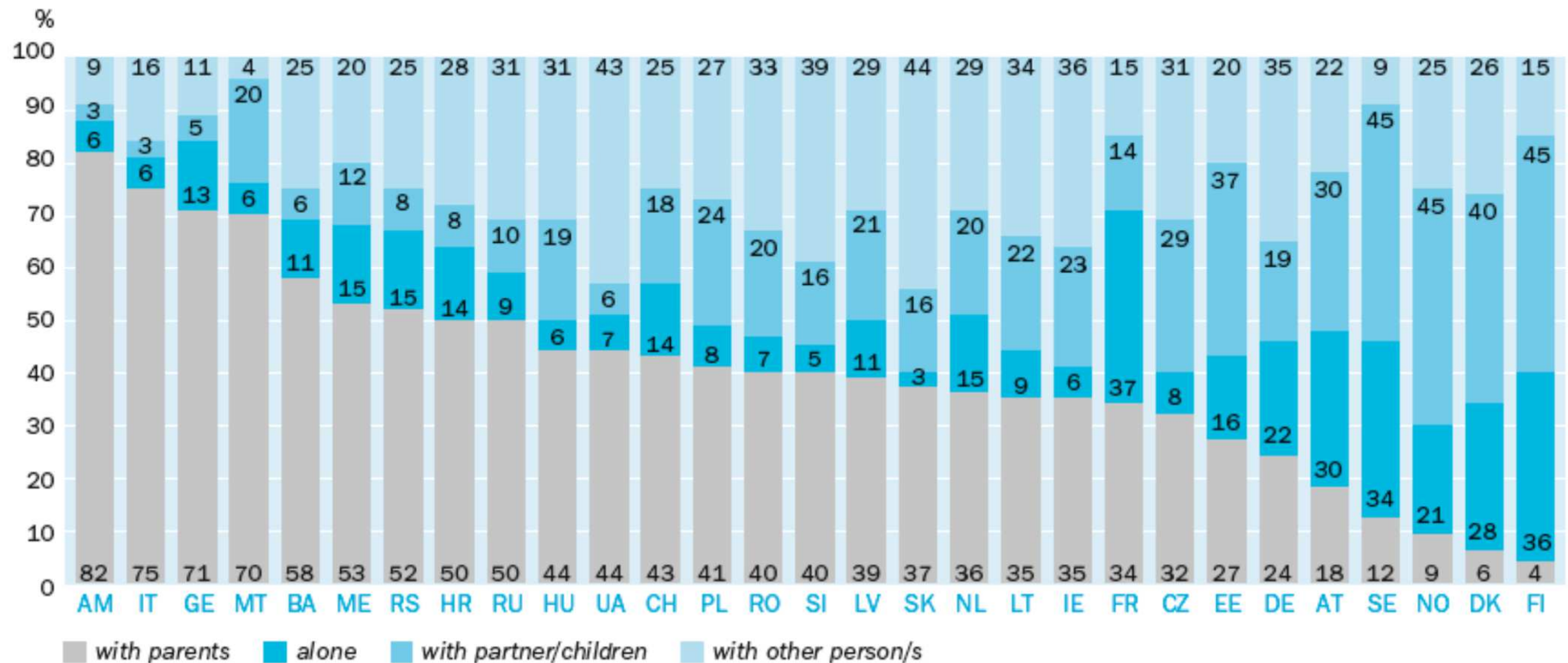
Types of student housing

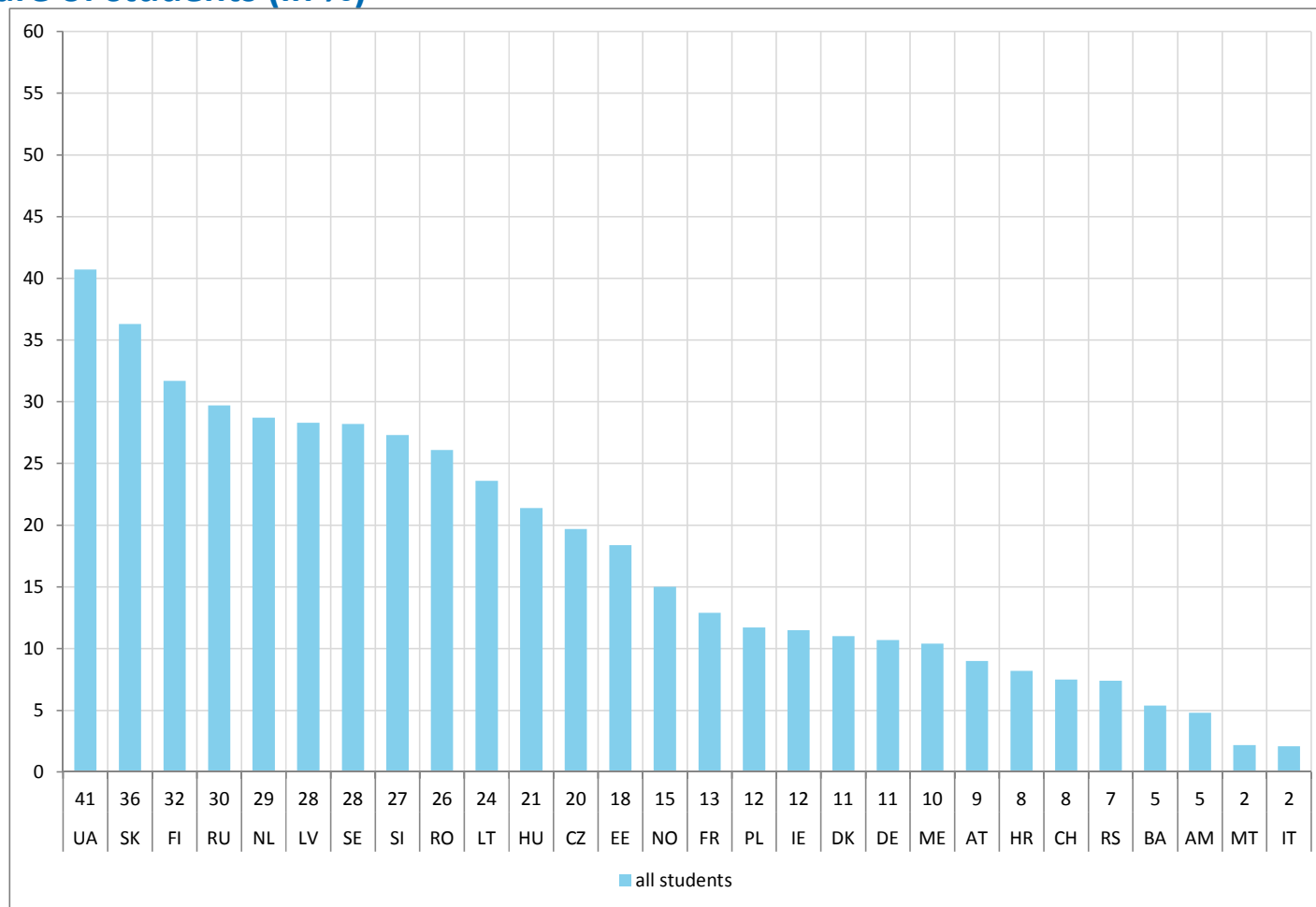
Share of students (in %)

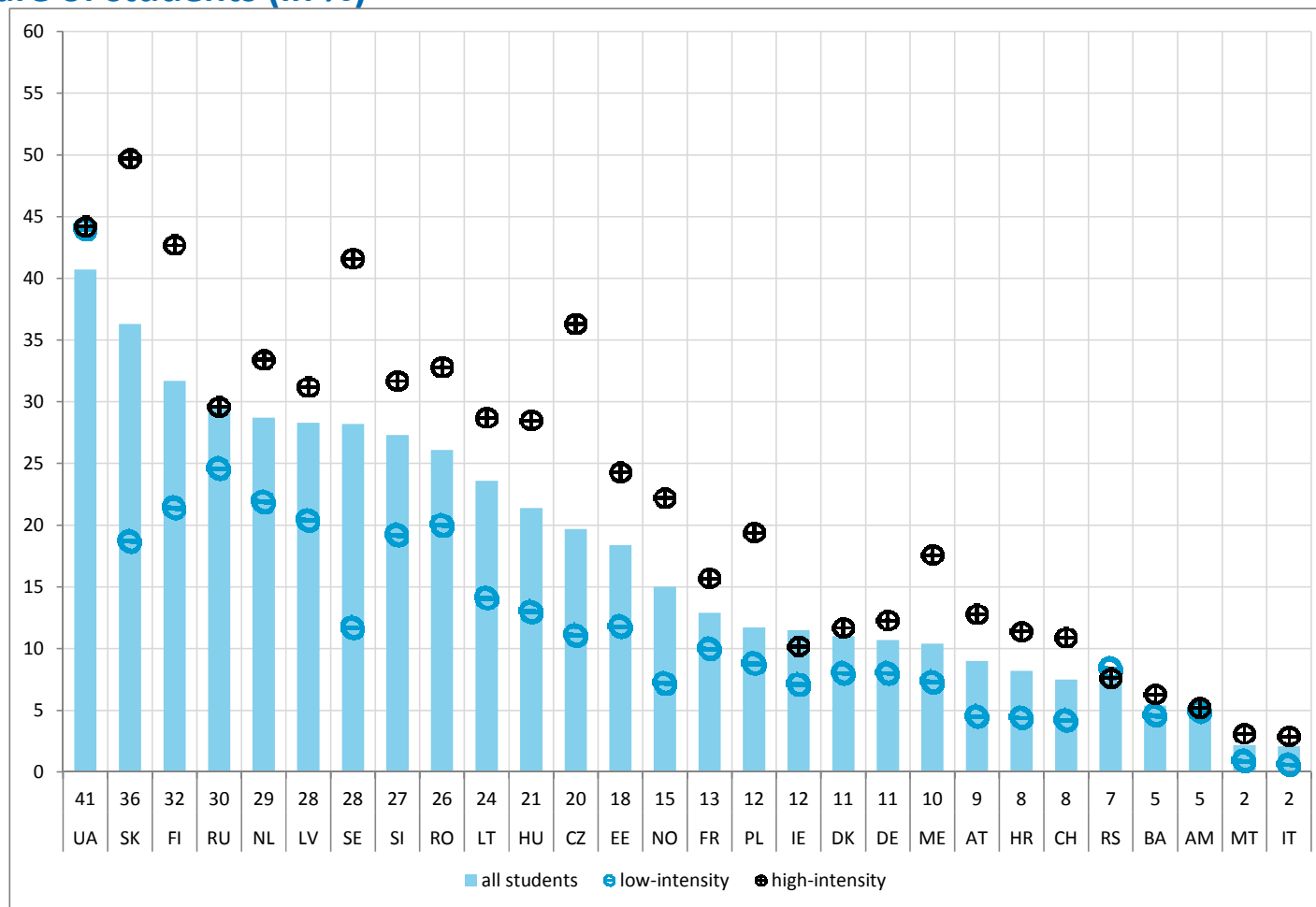

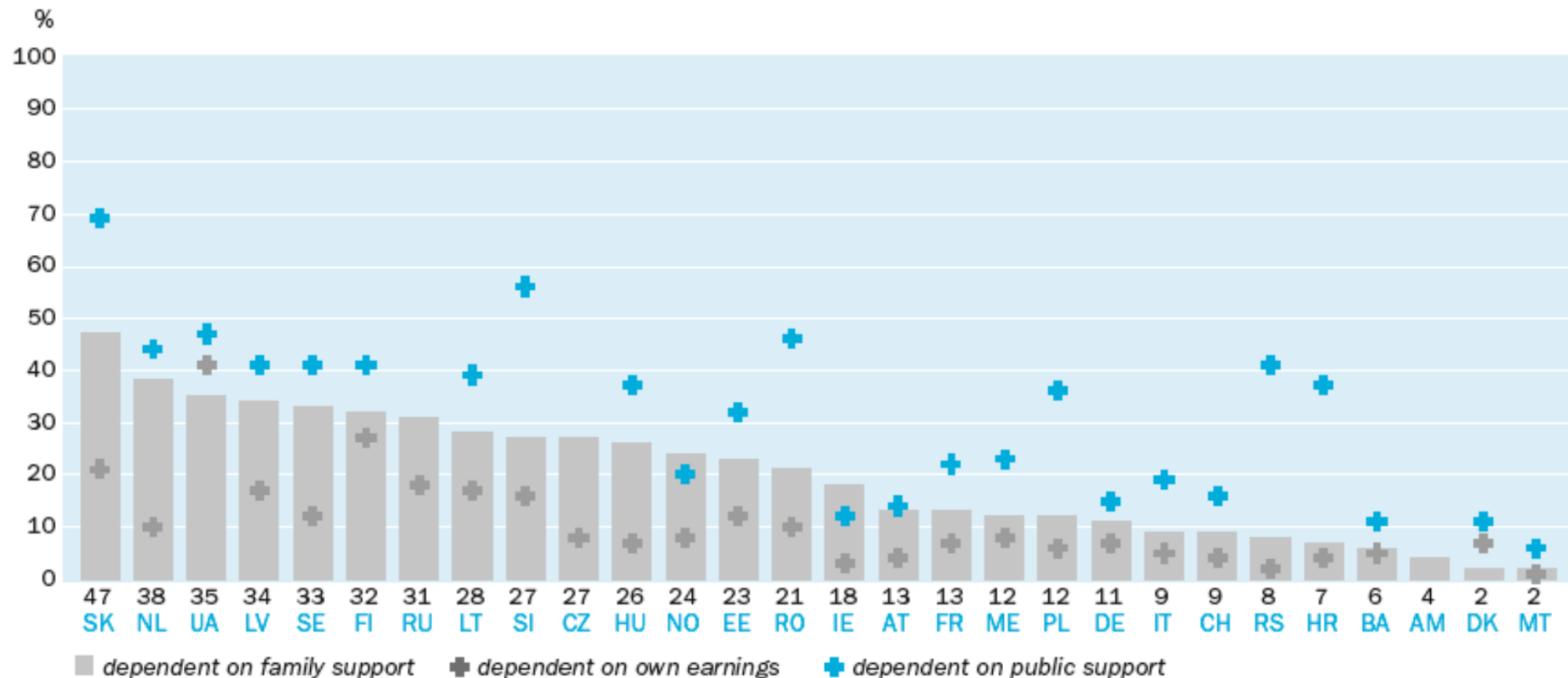

2) Results: Students living in student accommodation by dependency on income source

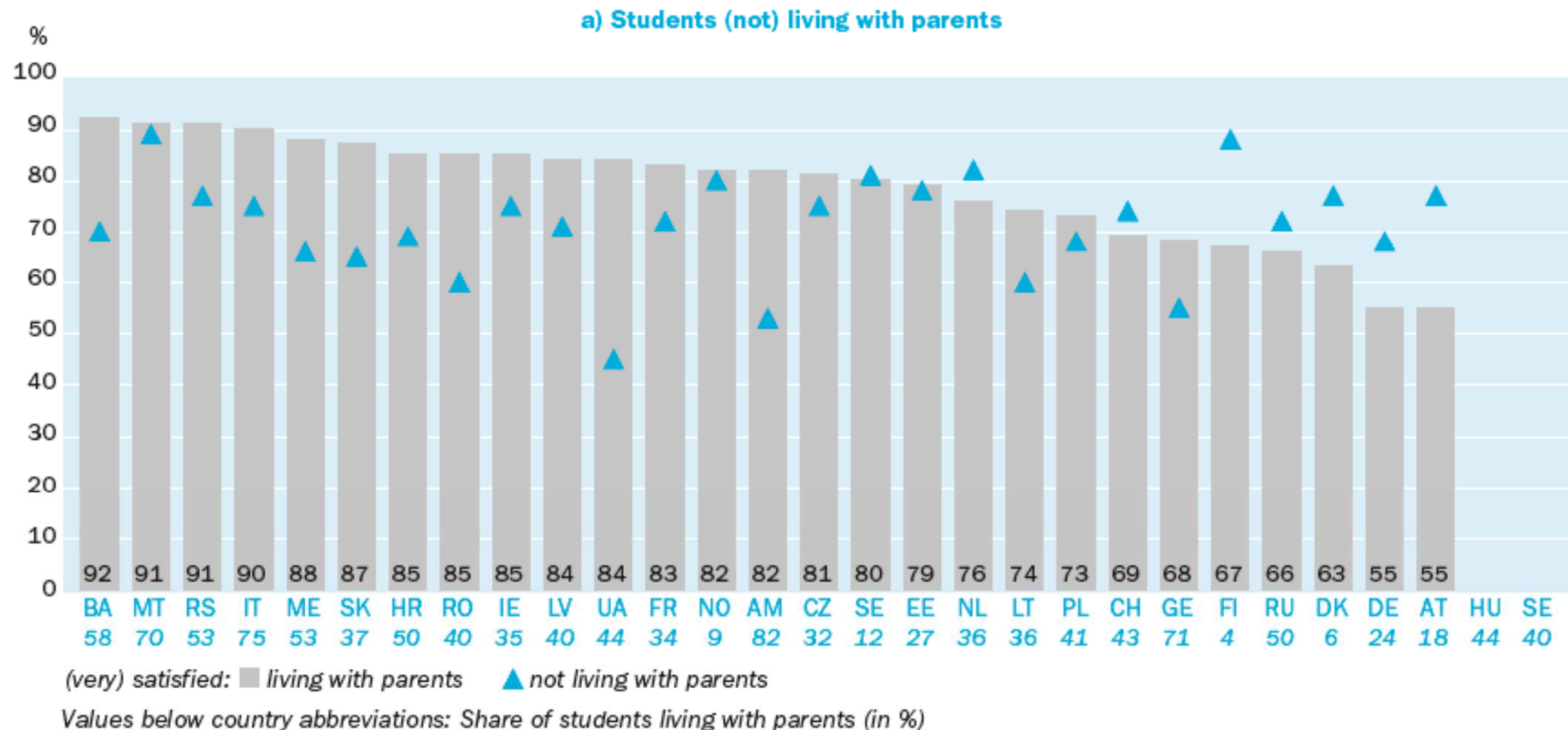
Share of students (in %)

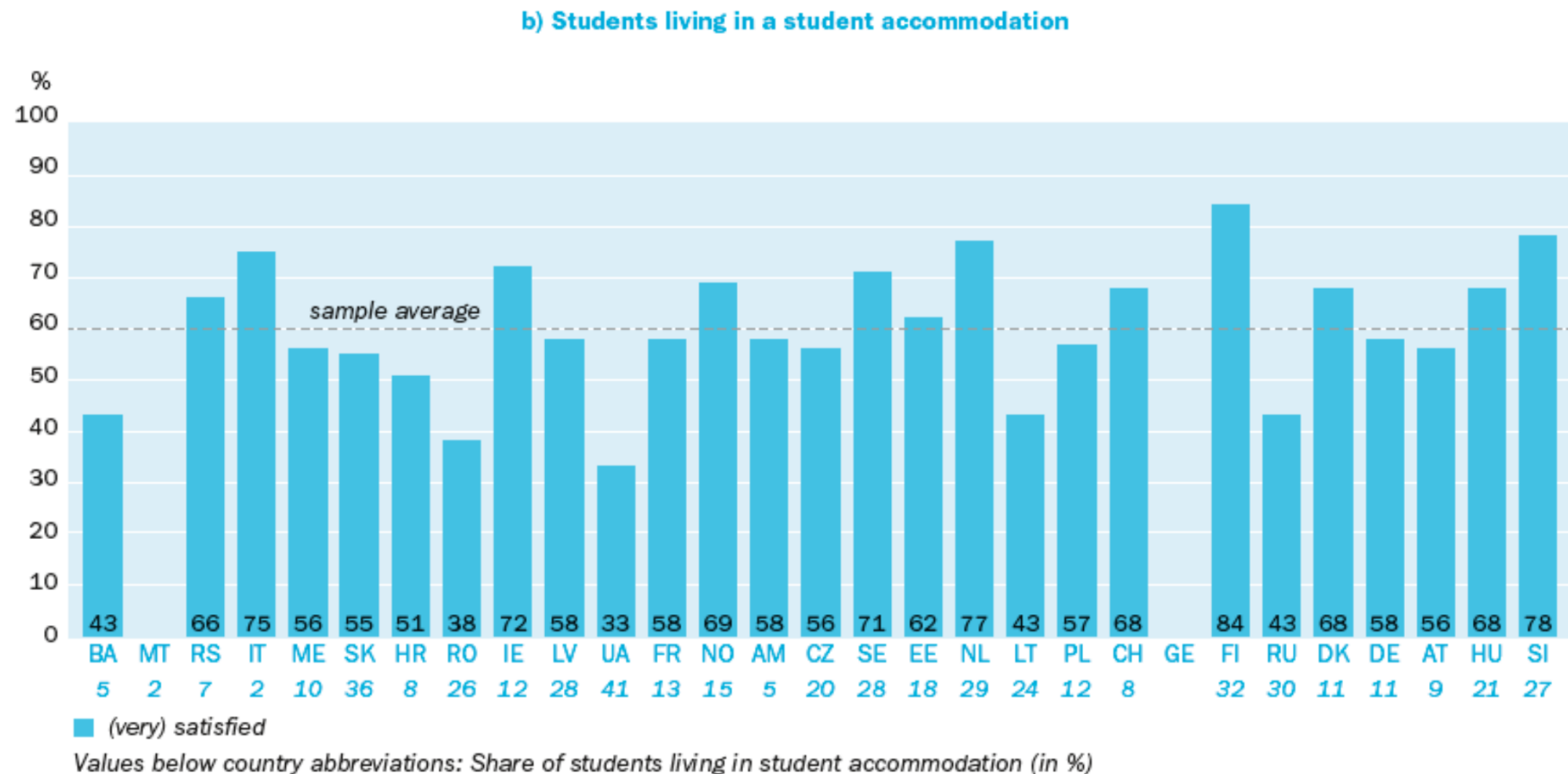
Share of (very) satisfied students (in %)

3) Conclusion

- In 2/3 of the EUROSTUDENT countries, living with parents is the form of housing with the single highest share among students. This way parents provide substantial support for their collegiate children.
- The state often supports students by providing student accommodation. In about 1/3 of countries, more than 1/4 of students live this way. This form of housing is especially utilised by students who are young, intensively involved in their studies, and dependent on public support.
- On cross-country average, almost 3/4 of students not living with parents are (very) satisfied with their type of housing. The same assessment holds only for 3/5 of students living in student accommodation.
